Narratives to Budget Sheets

Operating Fund:

This fund is the core fund for the general operations of the Rec Authority. The millage rate to be levied on the winter tax bills will be **0.15**, the same as last year. The primary goals of the Rec Authority supported by funding in the proposed budget for the coming fiscal year are: (1) the public purchase and preservation of Hickory Forest utilizing a grant from the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund; and (2) ongoing operations, maintenance and improvement of all Rec Authority properties.

Long-Term General Obligation Debt Retirement Fund:

The sole focus of this fund is to make the required payments on the general obligation bonds that facilitated the acquisition of the Authority's three current properties. The millage rate can adjust depending on the amount of debt service that has to be paid in each fiscal year, and the debt-service amount escalates each year through retirement of the debt. Based on last year's receipts, 2022 taxable values, and a debt service this fiscal year of \$668,759, the millage rate to be levied for this fiscal year will remain unchanged from last year (and the same since 2016) at **0.33**. December of 2022 will be the second-to-last levy for this fund.

Request for Community Police Officer

Dear Chairman Hentschel:

On behalf of the Charter Township of Garfield Board of Trustees, we would like to request an additional Community Police Officer (CPO).

As part of the road patrol division, the Sheriff's Office contracts with several townships to provide CPO positions. In addition to performing the regular duties of road patrol, these officers work closely with their township officials to provide proactive, community-oriented programs and projects such as crime prevention, home safety, fraud protection, active shooter awareness and more. CPOs work closely with schools in their townships and attend meetings of various business associations. They also work flexible schedules to address issues occurring within their townships.

Our cost share agreement with Grand Traverse County is currently covering 8 patrol, 4 CPO, 1 investigator, and a lieutenant who oversees all the Townships Community Policing efforts. This agreement provides the economies of scale for the Township and the availability of additional emergency staff when needed throughout the County.

With a growing Township population and current CPOs being very busy responding to complaints and other issues, a new CPO would allow for more proactive policing, particularly a relationship with students and staff in our schools.
